COURSE DESCRIPTION

To assist in conducting research in the field of labor and employment studies, the course provides an overview of the research strategies and techniques used to determine an information need, to access and evaluate information critically, to incorporate information into one's research, and to use and understand the information effectively and appropriately. Information literacy concepts such as research methods, scholarly resources, source evaluation, citation creation, intellectual property, and copyright will be covered.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Determine the nature and extent of an information need;
- 2. Access needed information effectively and efficiently;
- 3. Evaluate information and its sources critically;
- 4. Use information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose; and
- 5. Understand the ethical, legal and socio-economic issues surrounding the use of information.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

<u>In-Class Concept Worksheets</u> (40%)

There will be four (4) in-class worksheets requiring a degree of independent research and evaluation of information. Each worksheet will consist of an assignment based on the concepts of the Unit. Each worksheet will be distributed and completed in class. Each worksheet is ten (10) percent of your grade.

Required Reading (20%)

There are two (2) articles to read for the course. After finding and reading the article, you must complete the Required Reading Assessment that can be found in Sakai. Complete the assignment and hand in at the beginning of the next class session. Each reading assessment is ten (10) percent of your grade.

Final Quiz (10%)

A final multiple-choice quiz will be given on the last day of class. It is ten (10) percent of your grade.

Final Project (30%)

The Final Project will incorporate skills and search strategies covered within the course. The project is designed in two parts, each requiring a short essay backed with supporting evidence. It is thirty (30) percent of your grade.
