Course Goals

Work groups of various types are increasingly important to modern organizations. Consequently, group skills are emerging as a core competency for managers and employees at all levels.

This course will focus on the functioning of teams and relations. It will be heavily experiential, with hands-on exercises to develop skills and understanding.

Grades

- Grades will be based $\frac{1}{3}$ on weekly assignments; $\frac{1}{3}$ on the two group projects (weighted for your individual contribution); and $\frac{1}{3}$ on the quizzes. I will also consider your in-class participation as a factor in calculating the final grade.

Course materials

- Readings and all other course materials will be available on the course's Sakai site. There are no books to purchase for this course.

Assignments and assessment

- Weekly assignments will consist of some combination of readings, writing, and exercises, and work on your group projects.
 - All readings will be posted on Sakai.
 - You may submit assignments up to one week late *only* if you have received advance permission from me. Some credit will be deducted.
 - You may resubmit one assignment for grade reconsideration for this course
 - Requests for regrading must be submitted within one week of receiving your grade for the assignment

- Requests must be submitted via email to Prof. Dwyer and the Teaching Assistant(s)
- You will be a member of two different teams during the course. Each team will be required to do a project. Further details will be given in class and on Sakai.
- There will be three **short quizzes** (~20 minutes each).

Scheduling

As you can see from the list above, the class will be organized in modules of two sessions. You will be required to come to class for the first hour every week, but in one of the two weeks in each module you will not have to stay for the remainder of the class. This will allow us to do more intensive work with small groups. You are responsible for keeping this straight (or letting me know if you have questions about the schedule). On the weeks when you and your teammates are scheduled to leave after lecture, I strongly encourage you to work on your team projects.

Logistics & requirements

Attendance

- **This course requires regular attendance:** there will be considerable group work and open discussion during class. Given the interdependence of team members and the need for ongoing discussion of course material, you cannot pass this class if you slack off during the semester and try to make up for it at the end.
- **If you expect to miss one or two required classes, please use the University absence reporting website** <https://sims.rutgers.edu/ssra/> to indicate the date and reason for your absence. An email will be automatically sent to me.
- **If you expect to be absent more than twice, you *must* communicate with me as soon as possible**, in person or by email. I will try to work out a solution, but only if I know about it in a timely manner.
- I will excuse absences for good cause. I will *not* accept explanations that are not timely.
- More than two unexcused absences may lead to a failing grade for the course.

Lateness

- People who arrive late or leave early are disruptive to the class and their teams. You are expected to arrive on time and to stay until the end.
- If you expect to be late, let me know in advance if possible.
- Two unexcused late arrivals will be marked as one absence. Students who leave early without excuse will be marked absent for the entire class.

Communication with the instructor

- **I am open and available for discussion about any subject that affects your education.**

My experience is that students don't use regular office hours. I am available at any time by email, and in person before and after class. We can also set up mutually convenient times to talk in person or by phone; just let me know.

- In a complex course there are likely to be logistical breakdowns I don't know about – Sakai may be down, or I may forget to post an assignment or a reminder, or a requirement may be unclear, etc. It is in part your responsibility to let me know when you encounter such problems; I will try to fix them immediately.

Direct quotations must be identified by quotation marks *even if they're cited*. Don't cut and paste from the Internet without putting it in quotes! This trips up some students, and can be serious.

I am not very concerned with the exact form of your citation, as long as you make clear where a quote or passage came from.

Studying together is encouraged; but if answers from different students are the same or nearly the same it will be considered cheating. You should discuss the issues but not discuss detailed answers with each other.

Papers will be submitted to Turnitin.com for comparison with others in this course, as well as with past exams from this course and with paper-writing services, other publications, and web sources.
